Re: Recommendation of Award of 44 Avenue Rehabilitation from Highway 56 to Highway 12

#### **Background:**

Late July, the Town was notified of an additional \$707,509 in Municipal Stimulus Program funding available for construction projects from the provincial government. Administration evaluated all long term capital improvements and elected to tender the rehabilitation of 44 Avenue from Highway 56, east through to Highway 12 this fall to secure good construction pricing with the option to complete concrete work fall of 2020 with paving in 2021.

#### **Municipal Stimulus Program**

The Government of Alberta is providing additional capital infrastructure funding to municipalities and Metis Settlements to:

- sustain and create local jobs
- enhance provincial competitiveness and productivity
- position communities to participate in future economic growth
- reduce municipal red tape to promote job-creating private sector investment

Municipalities will be required to commit to taking concrete actions to reduce red tape and encourage private sector investment.

Project eligibility will be similar to the Municipal Sustainability Initiative (MSI), with modifications to ensure projects meet stimulus program objectives. Eligible project categories include: roads

- Engineering and architecture, including design, tender preparation and advertising, if part of an accepted construction project
- Construction of eligible projects must begin in 2020 or 2021.
- Proponents must attest that the project would not go forward this year in the absence of support through the stimulus program.
- Projects must not create operational funding requirements for the province, and must not result in municipal tax increases.
- Project Application Submission Submit by October 1, 2020
- Executed Memorandum of Agreement Submit with first project application (by October 1, 2020)
- Municipalities must commit to submitting an annual Red Tape Reduction report for each of 2020 and 2021 indicating how they have made progress in at least one of the following areas, including a qualitative description of specific actions taken: What steps have been taken to make it easier to start up a new business in the municipality? What steps have

been taken to streamline processes and shorten timelines for development and permit approvals? • What steps have been taken to make the municipality a more attractive destination for new investment and/or tourism?

- Municipalities may proceed with a project in anticipation that it will be accepted for MSP funding. However, if the project is deemed ineligible, the municipality remains responsible for all financial obligations it has undertaken with respect to the project
- All calls for proposals or tenders for projects to be funded under MSP shall be carried out in accordance with the rules, regulations, and laws governing such activities and in accordance with the best current practices. They must also be advertised in accordance with the guidelines of the New West Partnership Trade Agreement (NWPTA), effective July 2010, and the Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA).
- Any funding carried forward to 2021 must be expended on an accepted project before December 31, 2021.
- Time extensions for unspent MSP funds will not be granted.

Tenders do not include gst or contingency.

The option to have concrete replacements completed this year was provided in the tender, however, both contractors have indicated all construction to be completed in 2021.

#### **Recommendation:**

Administration respectfully recommends that Town of Stettler Council award the 44 Avenue Rehabilitation from Highway 56 to Highway 12to Border Paving Ltd. in the amount of \$456,241.25, with a contingency of \$100,000 for a contract cost of \$556,241.25, excluding GST. Administration also recommends utilizing Tagish Engineering for engineering services up to \$55,000 for a total project expenditure of \$611,241.25 with funding provided by the additional Municipal Stimulus Program Grant.

#### **Background:**

Red Willow Creek Cattail removal and culvert replacements was originally a two-year project with \$250,000 budgeted in both 2020 and 2021

Administration elected to tender as one project to see cost savings due to mobilization because of additional funding available in the 2020 Capital Budget.

#### **Budget Evaluation:**

Summary of Tenders Received by Tagish Engineering:

• Wally's Backhoe Services Ltd. \$586,068.18

• Watson's Welding Ltd. \$722,844.00 (Corrected)

• Unsurpassable Construction Ltd. \$1,981,016.00

Tenders do not include gst or contingency.

Rec Road culverts replacements were included as a provisional item in the tender to obtain pricing. At this time, the cost of the crossing replacements is high, and the culverts are in satisfactory condition, therefore this crossing will be deleted from the contract through change order. Discussions with Wally's Backhoe Services have confirmed the decision to delete this item.

Administration recommends utilizing Tagish Engineering for engineering services up to \$50,000 for a total project expenditure of \$440,410.68 funded through the 2020 Capital Budget.

The Town advertised the vacancy in February of 2020 and received expressions of interest from five well qualified individuals. Two individuals withdrew from consideration prior to a meet and greet that was set up on March 5, 2020 to get acquainted with each candidate.

Dear Steve Gerlitz,

Your Franchise Agreement allows for an annual change to the franchise fee percentage. However, specific procedures must be followed before the fee can be changed and take effect. This letter is intended to provide you with an overview of the franchise fee change procedure as follows:

- 1. Your Municipality must decide if a change is required and what the new fee percentage should be. ATCO Electric will provide revenue estimates to help you with this (if the new fee is greater than the pre-approved cap in your franchise, a different process is required).
- 2. In accordance with the Alberta Utilities Commission (AUC) Decision approving your Franchise Agreement, you must publish a public notice of the proposed change in the local newspaper with the greatest circulation. This notice must include the effect of the proposed change for the average residential customer. ATCO Electric can estimate the new charges and the impact on an average customer bill. We recommend that fee change notices be published before October 14, 2020.
- 3. Residents must have at least 14 days from the publication of the notice to make their concerns known to the Municipality and the Municipality is to respond to these concerns.
- 4. The Municipality will advise ATCO Electric by letter the new desired fee percentage. This letter must include a copy of the public notice with publication details (date and name of newspaper), and any comments the Municipality wants to include on the public response.
- 5. ATCO Electric will apply to the AUC to change the rate. Copies of the Municipality's letter and public notice will be included with the application. ATCO Electric must receive the municipality's request (complete with a copy of the notice) by **November 11, 2020** in order to obtain AUC approval and commence billing the new fee effective January 1, 2021.
- 6. The AUC must approve the change to ATCO Electric's rates. Provided the Commission is satisfied that proper notice was given they do not receive any objections or concerns from the public, the approval is anticipated to be issued quickly.
- 7. Once the rate change is approved, ATCO Electric will commence charging and remittance of the new fee.

Estimated revenues are calculated based on best available information and are subject to change due to AUC final approved tariffs, Alberta Electric System Operator (AESO) flow-thru charges or changes in load growth.

#### RE: August 1, 2020 New Price Schedules and Rates

In our ongoing effort to provide excellent service to the communities we serve, the following new rates or rate changes have been approved by the AUC effective August 1, 2020:

#### Price Schedule D22 – Small Technology

- This rate is applicable for small technology services with a maximum use of 1.0 kW on the existing D21 Commercial rate that would otherwise be required to pay the minimum 5 kW demand charge. This will reduce bills associated with facilities that use very low amounts of power.
- Example applications include (street crossings, signs, bus shelters, cable boosters, etc.).
- If any of your existing sites qualify for this new rate, you will be notified later this month.

#### • Price Schedule D23 – Electrical Vehicle (EV) Fast Charging Service

- This rate avoids a demand charge associated with high energy use over a short duration of time and only applies an energy charge for total use over a billing period. This will reduce bills and incent installation and use of EV fast chargers.

#### Price Schedule D61B and D61E – Invested Streetlight and Non-Invested Streetlight

- Rate changes have been approved to the existing streetlight price schedules (based on 150W HPS).

#### Introduction

The Town of Stettler accepted the offer from ATTS Group to obtain free educational and informational services about the trees on public land within the town limit. This visual assessment was carried out on August 21, 2020. Mr. Robert Spencer (Community in Bloom) along with Toso Bozic, were touring various town sites. This educational session was carried on streets, boulevards, parks, dog leash park, community forest, cemetery, sports fields, playgrounds along the Red Willow Creek riparian area and not on private properties. There were no official assessments nor any measurements taken during this visit. At each stop, the following topics were covered: overall tree health, ID tree pests, tree planting and maintenance, tree diversity, tree pruning and tree structure.

Trees are the crucial element and fabric of every rural community, including the Town of Stettler. Besides producing oxygen and reducing carbon-dioxide, trees provide many benefits to community populations including:

- reducing summer heat (cooling effects)
- protecting from cold winter winds (heating effects),
- enhancing cultural and spiritual experience,
- increasing property values.
- improving well-being through stress reduction and increased comfort,
- helping storm water management.
- providing a place to play and relax,
- reducing noise and dust effects
- providing a home to many wildlife species

The economic, social, environmental and spiritual values of trees are very well understood. Many studies have shown that having beautiful trees and shrubs on the properties will increase the overall property values between 5- 18 % as well as attract more businesses in the area where the trees are. Urban and rural community managers have realized that "green infrastructure" with mature trees and shrubs will increase the value of the land while reducing the cost of maintenance of the "gray infrastructure."

#### **Tree description**

Trees in the Town of Stettler have been growing since the town has been established. There are relatively a variety of trees and shrubs with different ages, structures, purposes and overall very good health and vigor characteristics. Trees and shrubs on streets, boulevards, parks, a cemetery along the natural forest (dog leash park) are overall very healthy with high biodiversity. The following trees species were identified during our tour in town:

- Spruce (white, Colorado blue, Fat Albert and other varieties of spruce)
- Pine (Lodgepole, Jack, Scotch and mugo)
- Ash (Green, Patmore, black)
- Manitoba maple, silver and tatarian maples
- American and Siberian elm
- Aspen and Balsam poplar
- Parks and playgrounds: pines, spruces, tamarack, bur oak, crabapples, linden, Mountain ash, Shubert chokecherry, white spruce, variety of willows, birch and some hybrid poplars
- Variety of different shrubs

During this educational session, the following observations were made:

#### **Boulevards and Streets**

The majority of the trees on the main street are dominated by mature green ash, American Elm and hybrid poplar with very few trees of white spruce, linden, Ohio buckeye and Shurbert's chokecherry. All of the green ashes and American elm trees are healthy with a few dead branches. Majestic American elm trees are healthy and not showing any signs of decline. A variety of Hybrid poplars are showing signs of decline with a few large dead branches. White spruce and pines are healthy with good growth. Very few green ash and American elm trees have been showing signs of stress mostly due to several years of harsh winter and environmental stress (weather, soil compaction and nutrients availability). We have stopped at several streets to inspect trees and the most common damage on trees are due to road construction damage on the roots.

There are several young elms, linden, Ohio buckeyes, Shubert's chokecherry trees on Main Street doing very well with no signs of decline. They have been properly installed and maintained. Trees and shrubs around the local private property are healthy adding the beauty to the town center. Planting more flowering trees/shrubs would add the overall appeal, reduce the 'heat" island and provide a more relaxing environment.

One of the main concerns is the relative proportional lack of tree diversity (elms, ash and hybrid poplar probably contained 90% of trees on street and boulevards) and the age of trees on the streets and boulevards. Even though they are very healthy, many of those trees are in the mature stage of life and will decline in the future. Having an overwhelming amount of ash and elm trees may pose a danger due to a possible insect (Emerald Ash Borer-EAB) and Dutch Elm Disease (DED) outbreak which may lead to

the loss of all ash and elm trees in the town. Alberta currently does not have any case of EAB (Winnipeg is the furthest city that EAB has been found) but this deadly insect is, unfortunately, moving west and is devastating to all ash trees in Canada. Throughout the STOPDED program, Alberta has been very effective to stop the spreading of DED. The town has been very active in the STOPDED program which is very important.

This would create a significant cost to the town for tree removal and replanting. For any future street tree planting, please plant a variety of coniferous species (pines, spruce, fir and tamarack) and hardwood species (linden, oak, Amur cherry, maples, ashes, Ohio buckeye, etc.) along with flowering trees and shrubs that will greatly add to the appeal but also improve tree diversity. Pruning and tidying up current trees would also improve the overall health and beauty. For any future road development please hire a qualified ISA Arborist to established a Tree Protection Zone (TPZ) and work with the construction company to reduce the impact on the root zone.

#### West Stettler Park and Playground

This very popular park and playground add significant beauty along Red Willow Creek. Even with very significant challenges such as soil salinity and heavy clay presence, trees and shrubs are very healthy and doing very well. There are many varieties of trees (spruce, pine, tamarack, birch, elm, hybrid poplar, ash, maple, willow, etc.) as well as a variety of shrub species (sea buckthorn, potentilla, spirias, ninebarks, etc). There are a few dead birch trees as well as some dead branches that need to be pruned. Adding more wood chips will further protect roots and add more nutrients to very poor soil. Several hybrid poplar suckers are showing along the pond as a natural regeneration. You may watch for spreading sea buckthorn as they can be very invasive and they are a very opportunistic shrub.

You have done an excellent job by adding wood chips to all planted trees in this park. Having wood chips in an understory greatly has helped tree survivability hold moisture longer, reduce weed issues but also do not allow the lawnmower to damage roots or contribute to soil compaction. Avoid root damage by increasing the blade height of a lawnmower.

Trees planted around the "hill" and open area are struggling to survive due to hard site conditions. Park requires proper planning of tree establishment. This would include the following: soil testing, careful tree and shrub selection, proper planting, the establishment of shelterbelt on the west side of the park to provide protection for the entire area, riparian natural restoration and a long term maintenance plan.

#### Millennium Tree Park

This is truly one of kind for a small town like yours. It is a true hidden jewel of your town green space area. This 20 year old park with an extreme variety of trees, shrubs, fruit trees and a variety of plants is a prime example of how to turn open a grass area into something wonderful. All of the trees and shrubs are healthy with very few declining trees due to a probable competition. Connecting with another small natural forest area maybe a future project. Also, you may build some signs with information about the park with the species list. The amount of edible cherries and fruits is astonishing. More promotion and awareness to residents about this park would be great. It is truly where the community got together and created a long-lasting forest to all town residents. Most of Alberta towns should be looking for your example and learn from a project like this.

#### Riparian area

The town of Stettler is very fortunate to have Red Willow Creek in the heart of the town. This area has very little biodiversity as there are no trees, shrubs, plants and animal species that should have been established in natural settings.



Picture 7. Some natural riparian areas (left) and no trees or riparian vegetation (right) Riparian restoration and tree planting are recommended in the area where there is a lack of vegetation. A new tree will reduce the potential of flooding but also add the beauty to the whole town.

It is also very important to remember that there are many rules and regulations under the Alberta Water Act that apply to this area. I would strongly recommend using "Stepping Back from Water Guide" before considering any activities in this area. Consider riparian tree restoration along Red Willow Creek by working with organizations such as Agroforestry & Woodlot Extension Society to restore the area under the trees.

#### **Cemetery**

This is a very well designed and maintained area with tree and shrub varieties. There are several tree species (poplar, pines, spruces, tamarack, oaks, willows, lindens, Mountain ash, Ohio buckeyes, and several others) as well as a variety of shrubs. Few Swedish aspens need to be pruned. If any poplar trees die, please replace with American elm. Avoid planting any Swedish aspen. There are heavy leaf rust disease infections on hybrid poplar trees.

#### **Dog Leash Area**

This natural aspen forested area is very popular in the town. The overall forest is very healthy, relatively young and vigor. Aspen is a dominant species with several balsam poplar, ash and Manitoba maples. Several dead trees need to be removed to reduce the potential for dogs, human and fire hazards. Understory planting of white spruce, pine and fir would add the diversity to the area. Also planting some flowing trees such as linden or fruit-bearing trees would add the colours to the area.

#### **Memorial park**

This tucked-in park represents the history of growing trees in town. General maintenance and inventory of tree species would be very beneficial as these trees and shrubs are growing well in a very harsh environment conditions.

#### Community gardens and fruit orchard area

Community gardens and fruit orchard area throughout the town is just unique and very exceptional to Stettler. As the majority of the towns or urban cities are lacking and do not understand the great concept of the community garden, you become national winners in Community in Bloom. Well designed and planned community gardens provide not just vegetables and fruits but also great opportunities for schools, young, seniors and businesses to be involved in the project like this.

The only thing you may consider is to establish a small tree nursery to become a supplier of trees for the town. Also transplanting some of the shrubs or grass into various towns' parks or town center area would ensure long term of this project.

This concept of a community garden can provide great educational opportunities for school children but also allow seniors to transfer the knowledge and experience to the younger generation. Capturing tremendous seniors' farming and gardening knowledge and sharing with school kids and young adults will be extremely satisfactory for both generations. This project may have a long-lasting impact on future generations.

#### **Suggestions**

The following are just suggestions to the town managers and councilors:

- Conduct Basic Tree Inventory of all trees in the town –you may just gather the number of trees, tree species, age and overall health for this inventory. This inventory will provide accurate information to be used to prioritize decisions and save money to the town regarding trees. Knowing tree species is composition is crucial to managing in case of insect and disease outbreak
- Develop a tree catalog just for the town- this catalog will help town managers, developers and the general public to choose the appropriate trees for this area
- > Educate the public and kids about tree values to the town
- Develop educational information about trees- this may include articles, technical information on trees, pests, tree planting, pruning, etc. for staff and general public
- ➤ Increase tree diversity selection and distribution —many tree species are missing within the town. More diversity will add more resilience and beauty to the town. Having an overwhelming amount of ash, elm and poplar tree could be very detrimental in future
- Provide training to staff providing basic training on pruning and pest ID would improve the performance of trees, reduce the cost of maintenance and will also better serve ratepayers
- Consider promoting your Community garden, fruit orchard and tree nursery to other communities.
- Consider riparian tree planting along Red Willow Creek working with an organization such as <u>Agroforestry & Woodlot Extension Society</u> to restore the area under the trees
- Consider hiring qualified arborist during sidewalks or road construction—to avoid damages to the trees
- Consider working with Alberta Transportation to get permits for planting trees along highways

He has also volunteered a great deal of his time to the Law Society of Alberta as well as the Edmonton Community Legal Centre. He was awarded the Queen's Council (QC) designation in his first term in office with the UCP.

Tracy Allard - Minister of Municipal Affairs



Minister Allard has been promoted to her first cabinet position within the UCP government. The Grande Prairie MLA currently chairs the Northern Alberta Development Council. She also was appointed to serve on the Standing Committee on the Alberta Heritage Savings Trust Fund as well as the Standing Committee on Alberta's Economic Future. She has served on numerous community boards and also franchised a number of Tim Hortons restaurants.

Doug Schweitzer, Q.C. – Minister of Jobs, Economy, and Innovation



Prior to entering political life with the UCP, Minister Schweitzer worked as a lawyer with Dentons Canada, specifically practicing in the areas of bankruptcy and restructuring. It is believed his experience in this area of law will give him a strong working knowledge of how government policies can hurt businesses, so do not be surprised to hear the words red tape coming from his mouth more and more frequently.

Tanya Fir, the former Minister of Economic Development, Trade and Tourism, will be shuffled out of cabinet and will sit as a backbench MLA with the UCP government.

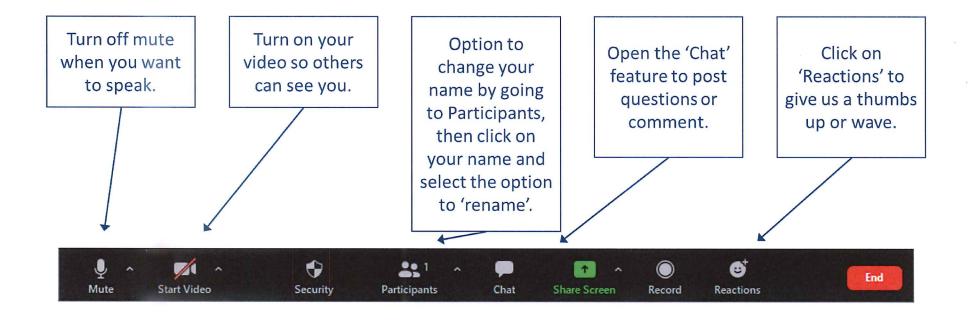

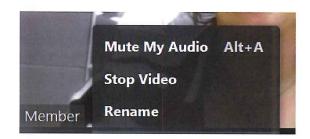

### Background and Purpose of the Assessment Model Review

- The Government of Alberta states that the goal of the review is to modernize the assessment model for oil and gas properties to enhance industry competitiveness while ensuring municipal viability.
- To-date the review has focused on the following properties:
  - Oil and gas wells and pipelines
  - Machinery and equipment (M&E) associated with well sites and facilities



# Overview of Regulated Assessment

- Some property in Alberta is assessed using regulated rates (versus a market-based system) because the property:
  - Seldom sells in the open market;
  - Crosses one or more municipal boundaries; or
  - Is of a unique nature.
- Regulated property includes farmland, machinery and equipment, and designated industrial property
  - Designated industrial property includes oil and gas wells, pipelines, railways, telecommunications, electric power systems, major industrial plants, and other similar property



# How is Designated Industrial Property and Machinery and Equipment (M&E) currently assessed?

A. Take the cost to construct the property less any excluded costs.

B. Apply an assessment year modifier to bring the construction costs to current day value.

C. Less depreciation of the property per the provincial government's depreciation schedule policy.

D. Less any additional depreciation to reflect a specific loss in property value.

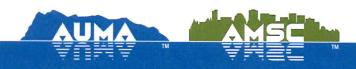

# What is being proposed?

- Four scenarios propose a mix of changes to the assessment of oil and gas wells, pipelines, and associated M&E including:
  - > Change in use of the Construction Cost Report Guide
  - > Increased depreciation rates
  - > Adjustment factor applied to deep horizontal wells, SAGD wells, and/or pipes greater than 10 inches
  - > Change in land assessment value based on the property's state of depreciation
- Depending on the scenario, total loss of municipal tax revenues in the first year could be \$117 million to \$301 million.
- Currently under review by cabinet.

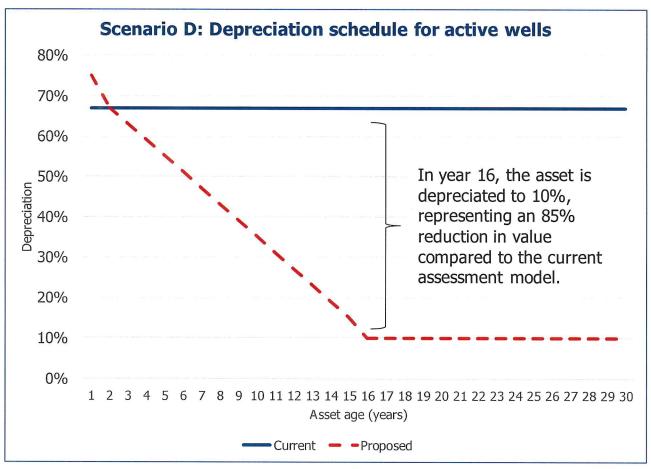

Scenario D proposes to reduce the assessed value of a well by 85% after 16 years.



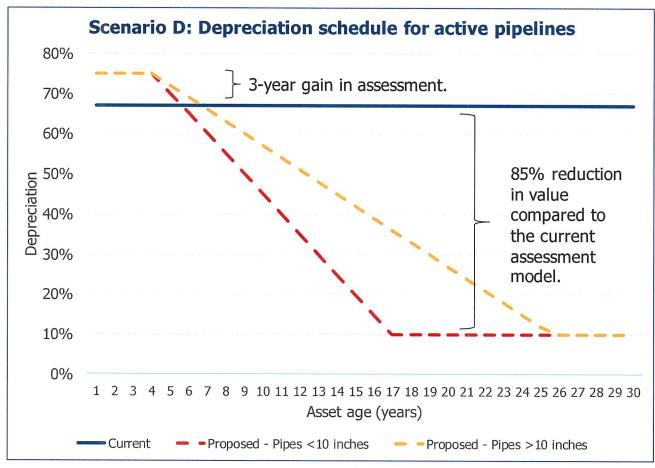

Scenario D proposes different depreciation schedules based on size of pipeline, but the overall impact is an 85% reduction in assessed value of pipelines when fully depreciated.

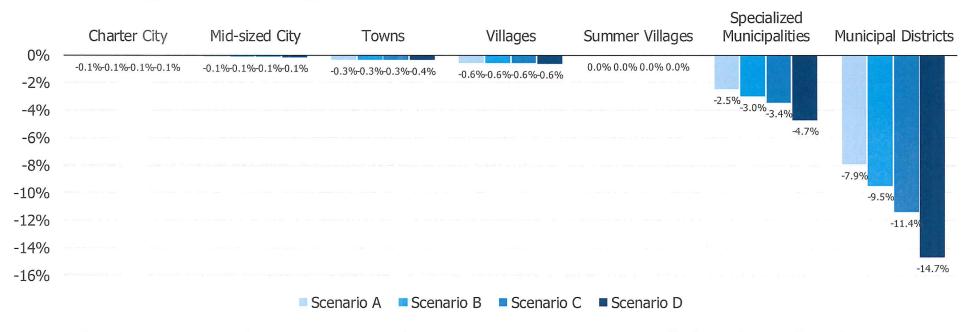

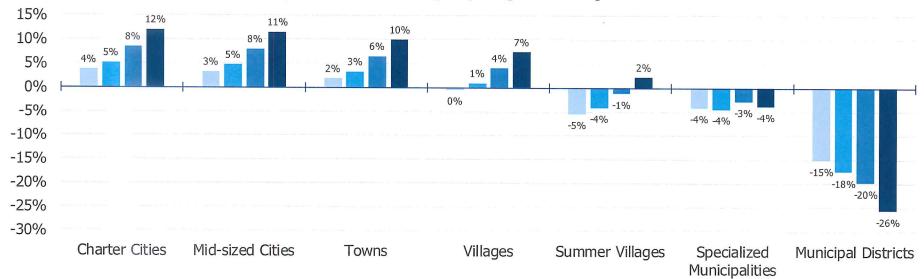
# Projected Impact on Urban Municipalities

- A proportion of provincial education property taxes will shift onto urban property owners.
- Urban municipalities under 5,000 population will be responsible for a greater portion of costs under the new police costing model due to the program's link to assessment.
- Risk to the sustainability of cost-sharing agreements and viability of small communities.

■ Scenario A ■ Scenario B ■ Scenario C ■ Scenario D

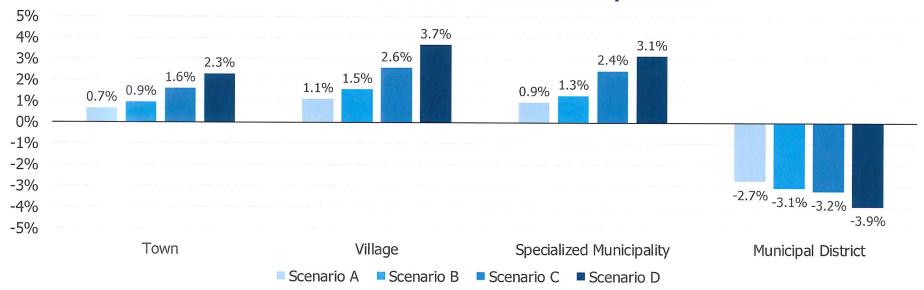
Assumption: The figures assume that the province will continue to collect at least \$940 million in education property taxes from non-residential properties despite the reduction in assessment.

# Shortcomings of the Proposed Models (1 of 2)

- Mainly benefits large oil and gas companies.
- No guarantee that the tax savings will be reinvested in Alberta through new jobs or capital investment.
- Tax reductions are permanent even if commodity prices change.
- Adds to the lack of transparency of how the oil and gas industry is supported through government policy.



# Shortcomings of the Proposed Models (2 of 2)

- Uses assessment methodology to meet tax policy goals, which violates the principles of property assessment.
- Shifts a greater share of provincial education property tax onto urban municipalities.
- Shifts a greater share of the new police costing model onto towns and villages under 5,000 population.
- Province has not shared a forecast of the long-term impacts.

### **Potential Solutions**

#### **Short-term**

- Abandon changes to the assessment model in favour of incentivebased tax reductions for companies investing in Alberta.
- Programs and incentives from Alberta Energy.
- Province should share in any assessment loss by reducing education property taxes.
