TAX INCENTIVE BYLAW

Stettler is the place for your business to set down roots and grow! With the newly enhanced Tax Incentive Bylaw, new and pre-existing businesses will have the opportunity to reap major tax benefits while building, renovating, or expanding upon their non-residential property.

Says Mayor Sean Nolls,

"With high interest rates and growing costs, the enhanced Tax Incentive Bylaw is an ideal way to stimulate commercial growth in the Town of Stettler. It is our hope that this program will help existing businesses expand, attract new entrepreneurs to our community, and demonstrate to established franchises that Stettler is the perfect place to do business."

Bylaw 2147-22 can apply to any permanent, non-residential development including new construction, revitalization, redevelopment, or expansion to an existing business that will generate a minimum of \$5,000 to increase the new construction assessment. Under Bylaw 2162-24 the tax incentive applies solely to the increase in assessment amount, under the following formula:

SCHEDULE A – Incentive Levels & Duration New or Increased Assessment

Applicants can visit the Town of Stettler Office to fill out the initial form, after which the application will be held until the project is complete. The Town of Stettler will then review the application and allow the contracted assessor to determine the assessment increase resulting from the project. 60+ TEAMS SOFTBALL TOURNAMENT

Have you ever wondered why the Town of Stettler is always so busy in the first weekend of June? Stettler Minor Ball uses this weekend annually to welcome participants that range from 7 to 18 years old! These tournaments are Stettler Minor Balls biggest fundraiser of the year and allows the not-for-profit association to stay viable and to purchase equipment for all.

This tournament started in 2016 and had 38 teams attend. The tournament has grown considerably over the past 8 years with the event hosting a record 70 teams this past season! Teams come from across Alberta, traveling from towns and cities such as Bonnyville, Calgary, Oyen, and St Albert. So, what does a 70-team softball tournament look like? When you include participants, coaches, managers, umpires, and families, the event brings in more than 2,000 people to our community for the three-day event.



You can imagine that running a successful fundraising

tournament of this size is challenging and can only be successful with the help of the numerous community volunteers that fill various roles. Volunteers required include coaches, managers, tournament committee members, diamond prep helpers, set up and tear down helpers, concession operators, and fundraising



volunteers. There are too many dedicated helpers to name, but they are all appreciated to ensure attendees have a fabulous weekend in our community!

While the event is focused on softball, the economic impact of tournaments like these within Stettler is immense. Over 3 days, participants and their families will fill local hotels, camp in local campgrounds, shop in local stores, and eat at local restaurants. This beneficial cycle continues as these local businesses then provide financial support to groups like Stettler Minor Ball and

other not-for-profit sports organizations.

The Stettler Minor Ball Association would like to give a special thank-you to Sarah Tucker. Since 2016, Sarah has donated hundreds of hours organizing the annual tournament in addition to other softball tournaments the community has hosted. Sarah has been responsible for obtaining registrations, scheduling games and umpires, and ensuring the various tournaments go off without a hitch and all the players have a great experience.

We look forward to seeing another successful tournament light up our community from May 31st-June 2nd!

STETTLER TRIATHALON

The Stettler Triathlon, an annual event since 2015, happens every year in the second or third weekend in July. In partnership with the Stettler Recreation Centre, a dedicated group of volunteers spend 1000+ hours organizing and delivering one of the best small-town races in Alberta. Over 200 athletes participate in this race which begins with swimming, followed by biking, and finishes with running. This is a race for the young and young-at-heart, for the experienced and for the beginner. Keeping this race welcoming and accessible to everyone is the guiding principle for this fun event. We see many of the same participants every year coming from many parts of Alberta, and even beyond! This is a family-friendly event, as the race has a variety of distances, age groups and categories, including a relay and a 5K run!



This race would not be possible without the support of many local organizations, businesses, and community groups. The sponsorship that the Triathlon receives ensures that every racer receives a medal and much needed nourishment after the race.

CAPITAL PROJECTS 2024

Each year, the Town of Stettler Council approves a five-year Capital Budget. This budget focuses on the major improvement priorities within the Town, which helps provide a high level of service for residents and visitors. Highlighted below are notable infrastructure improvements slated for 2024.

47th Avenue Watermain Replacement

This summer, a hired contractor is set to replace the cast iron watermain and lead water service lines between 46th-48th Streets to properties along 47 Avenue. The consistent removal of cast iron and lead projects are important to ensure that the water we provide to our residents is of the highest quality. The removal of lead services lowers lead exposure and the replacement of cast iron mains reduces the likelihood of watermain breaks.

Project Budget: \$350,000



Paving Upgrades & Additions

Town Council has requested that Administration explore safe pedestrian access along Spruce Drive as part of ongoing pathway construction. Administration will be engaging with the adjacent landowners to explore sidewalk options in this area of town. Spruce Drive, from Highway 56 to 61 Street, is set to be rehabilitated this summer. Work will include milling the existing asphalt and installing new asphalt paving.

Project Budget: \$530,000

Airport Runway Rehabilitation

Town of Stettler was the recipient of a Community Airport Grant valued at **\$1,482,000** from the Provincial Government to help rehabilitate the existing airport runway. The grant provides provincial funding for 75% of project costs, with both the Town of Stettler and County of Stettler Councils providing the remaining funding of \$250,000 each.

Project Budget: \$250,000

SUMP PUMPS

In most of Canada, it is illegal to discharge groundwater from your sump pump into the sanitary sewer; in

Stettler, it's a contravention of Sump Pump Bylaw 1102, which has been in place since 1971. There's a very good reason for this and other similar municipal by-laws: cities want to avoid putting clean water into the lines that carry sewage and waste to treatment plants so as not to overwhelm them.

It might seem like the most convenient route for discharge, but when a sump pump connects to the sanitary line, there is the potential that sewers may fill beyond capacity. This, in turn, creates a heightened risk of water and sewage coming back up through your pipes and damaging your home.

All sump pumps in Stettler must be plumbed to the outside of your house and discharged onto your property. This summer, town staff will be visiting homes for inspections to ensure that all sump pumps are plumbed to the outside of the house. Failure to comply with these requirements may result in penalties being imposed.

PROVINCIAL DROUGHT PREPARATION

Our Town and other municipalities have received a letter from the Alberta Minister of Environment and Protected Areas discussing the mild winter, and potential continuing drought conditions in Alberta. Alberta is currently in a Stage Four Drought (there are five stages, with five being the highest). The province is concerned that conditions will worsen, and the province may move to a Stage Five drought if spring conditions do not bring much needed rain. In preparation, the Town of Stettler is completing the following steps:

Town of Stettler Preparation

- Reviewing our existing water use license so that we are aware of any conditions that may impact access to water during a drought.
- Participating with the province and the Drought Response team to find solutions that ensure that if we all use less water, there will be more water available to all.
- Preparing water shortage plans so that Stettler is ready to respond if water availability decreases.
- Strategizing how to communicate thoroughly with residents on all future planned impacts to water restrictions as the situation develops.

In the meantime, what can you do to help?

Ways to save water at home

Take a shorter shower

Spending only 5 minutes in the shower saves up to 8 gallons each time.

Turn off the tap

Turning off the tap while brushing your teeth saves up to 2.5 gallons a minute.





Fix leaking taps

Fixing household leaks right away saves up to 20 gallons a day.

Wash full loads

Wait until you have a full load before using the dishwasher and washing machine, and use an eco setting, if possible.





Toilets:

Check that your toilet isn't leaking, a leaky toilet can waste 100 gallons a month.



Opt for a dual flush toilet



Older toilets use up to 7 gallons of water per flush. Install a high efficiency toilet and cut this down to 1.28 gallons or less per flush.

The Town of Stettler has an incentive for homes built prior to 2007 to replace 13-20 litre toilets. See www.stettler.net for more information.



HOUSING ASSESSMENT

The Town of Stettler has contracted bassa Social Innovations through the 2024 Capital Budget to complete a Housing Assessment and Housing Strategy. This document will serve as practical information for the Town and developers to ensure that we are meeting the housing needs of our community.

Housing Assessments & Strategies...

- Provide need and demand for non-market housing, owner market housing, and rental market housing.
- Address gaps and priorities in the continuum of housing including homelessness, special needs housing, affordable rental housing, rental market housing, and owner market housing.
- Identify public and private land available for development.
- Offer funding tools to leverage partnerships with government and private developers to provide more housing.
- Streamline the planning policy and process to allow for diverse housing.

Throughout the assessment and strategy process, bassa Social Innovations will be visiting the Town of Stettler and hosting various public engagement sessions to get a complete understanding of our community's needs. COMMUNITY GARDENS

Are you an avid gardener looking for just the right spot to watch your fruits and vegetables grow? Maybe you're new to gardening and looking to just get started with a small area? Renting a space at one of the Stettler Community Garden plots may be just what you need to get your green thumbs going!

The Stettler Community Gardens opened in 2010 with the Central Garden. Fast forward to 2024, and our community now boasts 3 Community Garden locations, including the North East Garden, Central Garden, and South Garden. Each community garden area includes a variety of sizes such as 10ft x10ft, 10ft x 22ft, and 22ft x 22ft plots. All of the three gardens include private plots, a tool shed, water access, and fruiting shrub borders. The Garden plots can be rented for the season for a minimal fee ranging from \$5 to \$20.

New this year, and in addition to the standard plot sizes, the Central Garden will be offering 10 (4ft x 8ft x 18") high raised beds. The raised beds are made out of recycled plastic lumber provided by Pnewko, which is a family-run company out of Central Alberta specializing in the reduction of landfill garbage.







Community Garden Reminders

- The gardens are privately rented, planted, and cared for. They belong solely to the renter for the season.
- The fruiting shrubs bordering the gardens are free for anyone to help themselves to!
- Gardeners cannot start planting until all plots have been staked and numbered.
- Gardeners must stay within plot boundaries and perform regular maintenance of the assigned plot and adjacent area/pathways.
